This exhibition bears testimony to their efforts and their service to the community.



Natural materials, original sculpture installations and seamlessly proportioned spaces are integrated to create a sophisticated and modern "Asian influenced" residence. "With an intention to create a small intimate hotel reminiscent of a private residence, I have purposely conjured a sense of tranquility throughout the design and ambience of the hotel," says Andre Fu. The result is a sophisticated modern-oriental residence, designed with respect to balanced geometry and symmetry, providing all the comforts of a stately home. The palette is restrained, with the use of bamboo, lacquered panels to create an oriental sensitivity, yet the flavour of the scheme, when viewed in its entirety, remains international.



The project is located at Yau Tong, Kowloon, adjoining Eastern Harbour Crossing Approach Road and Yau Tong Road. Our planning and design theme is to create a sustainable community for a green and healthy living habitat for around 2,000 families. We adopted a holistic approach to overcome the site constraints, optimizing development potential, enhancing the built environment and creating a sense of neighbourhood. We pioneered to adopt microclimate studies to enhance the wind environment, natural ventilation, daylight, and mitigate solar heat gain, whilst mitigating severe noise impact due to heavy traffic. As such, we provided people-oriented quality housing in a garden setting within this congested site, comprising two 39-storey public rental housing residential blocks, a non-domestic block providing 169 car parking spaces, welfare facilities including a Day Care Centre for the Elderly, an Early Training and Education Centre, and a Kindergarten.

The 4,306 sq m site is flanked by Plantation Road to its south and Severn Road to its north. It is perched on a cliff-edge overlooking Victoria Harbour and much of Hong Kong Island.

The proposal avoided the costly and time-consuming process for town planning lease modifications whilst complying with the restriction by proposing six triplexes spread over two blocks sharing two common entrances.

Each triplex is approximately 4,500 sq ft, built to the maximum height limit around a central sky-lit atrium. Each triplex is designed in split-levels, staggering each floor by a half storey front and back.

The triplexes are pure geometric forms juxtaposed, creating planes and volumes that are clearly defined. Cladding materials are contemporary; modular aluminum panels in white and grey, polished and flamed beige granite with an expanse of high performance glass panels.



The adaption of scissors staircase leads to the progressive articulation of the building plan complying with local socio-economic constrains in Hong Kong. Scissors staircase lives in the core of almost every building in the contemporary city and its formulated interventions still resonance in the architecture of our present time. Though we seldom walk from one storey to another by intervention, this syndrome of rare encounter of scissors staircase bring us to a psychological displacement, where the context is misplaced and we often are disoriented by journey.

The Architect was faced with the task to capitalise the full potential of the beautiful sloping site at the Peak which was occupied by a single 'Taipan' house, both in terms of development area and its magnificent 270 degree view.

The Architect created a crescent internal road to reach 4 independent houses sitting on terraces at different levels. Each house is oriented strategically to the unique view while providing self-screening to achieve maximum privacy of the garden and pools.

The pitched roofs of the houses provide harmonious roofscape within the development and echo the silhouette of the hills.

With the spatial design of all houses based on a naturally lit double storey stairwell, each house and gardens has its individuality in design. The external finishes of each house are based on a common palette of stones and terracotta tiles, but is charged with different highlights and textures to give its unique identity.

The Landmark occupies nearly a full city block in the heart of Central District. With twin 44-storey office towers, the development features extensive retail and public areas, extending four levels above ground and linked by bridges to neighbouring developments.

The column-free office floors have deeply recessed windows on all sides which reduce cooling loads.

Tower columns extend through the lower public areas, forming the edge of a large skylit square atrium. Its shape is accented by balconies and terraces and animated by a fountain, trees and public art, making the landmark a popular urban amenity and meeting place and the centre of Central.

HKBC Media has established their headquarters in Chai Wan, Hong Kong. The group promotes creative sound products and online media broadcast to distribute influential voices for the new generation. Our task is to set the creative mood and craft a suitable corporate image for the group.

The space is divided into four zones, centralized by the Creative zone which is surrounded by the Recreation, Production & Management zones. The library in the centre is the heart of the office space. Against a sophisticated yet cutting-edge backdrop, it can be further expanded and spatially connected with the main studio, through a 2.5m x 5.7m TV swing door. Recreation zone behind the Library promotes healthy and playful environment for the employees of this 24-hour operating office.

Physical well being and psychological well being for the people are the prime concerns of this project.

The unique design of this building takes care of the effective people flow and improve natural ventilation.

Shaped like a hill, the building accommodates the Chinese tradition of Bye Saan --- going up the mountain to pay respect to the ancestors at festivals. With its roof being flights of landscaped steps, it enables people access to the niches of their ancestors on the different floors in a nature like environment.

Located in the urban setting, it is important to address the psychological impacts to the neighborhood. The niches walls are arranged perpendicular to the main road and the ground floor is a public sitting out area, there is no niche visible from the street.

Lau Tat Ying was the Design Team Leader of the project Here, the image of the columbarium as a scary ash-storing structure has been transformed into a pleasant park enjoyable by the public all year round.

This project is an urban conservation and adaptive re-use of a rare and intact ensemble of 10 shophouse buildings from 1910s. The project brief asked for three almost impossible concurrent tasks: (a) Provision of a 300 sm Public Open Space within a tight urban site as required by Town Planning, (2) Preservation of the historic shophouses buildings on site, and (3) Revitalizing it into an Art and Cultural Centre as resulted from Public Consultation. This design celebrates the value of Pre-war Shophouse as a testimony of historical development of architecture of Hong Kong. Through the revitalization of this rare and intact historic ensemble to suit modern public use, the wisdom of spaces and materials of early urban architecture is interpreted and presented to the public, and the practical potential of re-using and improving urban historic fabric is demonstrated to the society.

The Visual Arts Centre makes available studio and exhibition spaces to sculpture, ceramic and print making artists and was converted from an original building in Victoria Barracks, now Hong Kong Park. Originally officers' quarters, the Cassels building was built in the 1900's and forms part of the Hong Kong architectural heritage. Comprising four graceful, stepping and disjointed 3-storey blocks it was domestic in scale with little inter-connection. The studios and exhibition spaces were accommodated in the existing building to suit the building volume. Service spaces and larger spaces including a lecture theatre were housed in a new extension which allows the facades and profile of the existing building to remain entirely intact. A sky-lit circulation spine encloses a system of bridges, ramps, voids and stairs making the intricate circulation, with all levels accessible to wheel chair traffic, comprehensible, and bridges the circulation and the services between the existing building and new extension. The Visual Arts Centre was officially opened in May 1992.

The TWGHs Coffin Home has over a hundred years of history dating back to the 1890s. It provided temporarily coffin storage for deceased oversesa Chinese workers enroute from aboard to their home town. The need for the service has greatly declined and the compound has been turned into a historic heritage. The TWGHs has decided to restore the estate in order to preserve the history and its tradition.

The estate of the Coffin Home occupies a compound of over 6000 sqm in the scenic Sandy Bay Cemetery. There are 7 clusters of buildings. They were constructed over a period of 80 years. Each of the building clusters carries a distinct architectural character, ranging from traditional vernacular village style to a mix of colonial and Chinese style. A detailed study based on historic records and collections from the TWGHs Museum was conducted before the carrying out of the restoration work. The compound has been restored to reflect different periods of operation in context with their respective history.

The project was recognized by the HKSAR Government with the Top Award of Honours in the 2004 Hong Kong Heritage Award. It was further honoured in the 2005 UNESCO Asia-pacific Heritage Awards for Cultural heritage Conservation.

Lok Fu Shopping Centre Phase 2 was to create a physical community / shopping center on top of Lok Fu MTR Station, connecting to existing housing estates and community facilities, while creating a landmark meaningful to residents of Lok Fu.

Architectonic forms are selected to represent its urban context, harbouring among housing blocks, public parks as well as multi-level of transport modes. Formal collisions and spatial intersections resulted from tectonic superimposition created opportunities for interesting yet meaningful spaces within this miniaturised metropolis. Lok Fu Shopping Centre Phase 2 thus attempted to represent Hong Kong's urban complexity in a rational and illustrative manner.

A century ago, the Furen Society (輔仁文社), veiled in the alleyways of Pak Tsz Lane, sowed the seeds to the Xinhai Revolution (辛亥革命). In 2011, its surrounding site has been revitalized as a courtyard park with conserved trees, old stone wall and a water well, and traced the footprint of historic settlement lot plans. With due respect to the as-found site formation and configuration, the design of Park Tsz Lane Park comprises a feature pavilion, terraced exhibition spaces linked in ramps and a children play area. The park opens at the centenary of and commemorates this place as the breeding ground to the Xinhai Revolution.

Ronald Lu & Partners designed the Park as a humble one with whitish wall plasters, Chinese granite pavers, recycled timber with script inscription, and bronze sculpture, the architectural elements are infused with revolutionary spirit. Visitors and locals both young and old can traverse time through space or rest in this hidden urban oasis.



This work represents the preliminary findings from my ten-month Fulbright research grant. The research evaluates the Kowloon Walled City architecturally in order to appreciate this unique housing phenomenon as a hard-to-come-by case study on high density urban housing design. Although the development of this living environment was shaped by a variety of historic, political, social and cultural factors, by focusing on the architectural principles found at the Kowloon Walled City, I hope to offer a unique perspective, one which investigates how the architecture and the community have influenced each other.

The main goal of my investigation is to explore the interrelationship between the Walled City's architecture and its inhabitats and to examine how this interrelationship has surprisingly benefited the sense of community in spite of the Walled City's notorious reputation as a ghetto.





The book begins with a brief description of this sense-and-sensibility design approach. To vividly explain how different requirements are being accommodate to generate an architectural solution that seeks a balance, it is followed by a catalogue of Aedas projects designed by Ken Wai based on these principles, which covers a series of building types including office, mixed-use, hospitality, residential, infrastructure, institution, interiors and civic architecture. Each project is explained through drawings, plans, photos and detailed descriptions in order to present the full picture.


